## "To alert or not to alert" (2)

Following on from last month's article, try this quick quiz. Under the ABF/NSW

Some common questions about alerts: what to do if...

- \*\* I forgot to alert and only realised later in the auction (or even in the play)?
- Call the director immediately. There are some actions the director can take which may minimise the problems caused by your forgetfulness. The earlier you realise and call the director, the better it is likely to be for your side.
- \*\* My partner didn't alert my bid when he should have?

- Keep very quiet until the correct time according to the laws. That is, if you become declarer or dummy, call the director and tell the opponents at the end of the auction. If you become a defender, call the director and tell the opponents at the end of the play. (This is exactly the same as if your partner were to give an incorrect explanation about the meaning of your bid.)
- \*\* My partner didn't alert my bid and now he has made a bid which I think is alertable? When he doesn't alert, I know he thinks he is bidding naturally, but under our system it is something special.
- Alert anyway. It is true that this will make partner realise his error, but the laws require you to alert. It is likely that the director will be needed to sort out the problem. There are a whole different set of procedures which the director will apply to ensure that the opponents are not damaged by you "waking your partner up".
- \*\* I think that my partner may have made a special call which I should alert, but I can't remember the system?
- Call the director. He may choose to ask you to leave the table while partner explains his own bid; that way your opponents find out about what your agreements are, as they are entitled to under the laws, and you don't get to hear your partner explain his own bid.

## What happens when I haven't alerted when I should have?

It is up to the director to determine whether the opponents have been damaged by your failure to alert. It is often a fairly complicated process, which I won't detail here. It may be that the director will award an adjusted score to compensate the opponents if he believes that they may have been disadvantaged. This may take the form of a score which is different to the one obtained at the table, or it may be an artificial score — a certain number of matchpoints (percentage) or IMPs for each side.

One very important principle which players often do not realise is that just because there has been a failure to alert, it does not mean that the offenders will automatically be penalised and consequently the non-offenders benefit. In fact, the non-offenders have some responsibility to protect themselves in certain circumstances even though the opponents may have neglected to alert when it seems they should have. The more experienced the player is, the higher the responsibility placed on them to try to mitigate any problems arising from a potential failure to alert. The following two examples which I have encountered in the past year may help to demonstrate this principle.

(1) West opens 1S, North bids 2NT (no alert), East passes, South bids 3C and that becomes the final contract. It goes one off, but it turns out that EW can make nine or ten tricks in spades. East held 10 points and four spades and calls the director. As might be expected, 2NT was the unusual no-trump showing both minors. As it was a conventional call, it should have been alerted. East claimed that when it wasn't alerted, he thought it must have shown 20-22 points and so he didn't bid. As East was a very experienced, this was clearly nonsense. He was very aware that 2NT was not natural. He had hoped that he would get a good result at the table, and if it didn't work out, he would call the director to get the normal result restored.

If you thought that that was a prime example of "bush lawyering", what about this next one?

(2) With just NS bidding the auction goes, 1NT -2C - 2D - 3NT (no alerts). East, on lead with five diamonds, does not lead one and the contract makes. EW could have taken the first five diamond tricks. He calls the director because South had failed to alert 2D. (2C was simple Stayman, which didn't require an alert as it is a self-alerting call. ie. considered automatically alerted. Technically, 2D, denying a major, should have been alerted - a conventional call.) East claims that when 2D wasn't alerted he assumed it must have been natural and so didn't lead a diamond. Like in the first example, East is quite experienced and was very well aware of what the auction was all about. And even if there had been any doubt, he had the opportunity to check about the meaning of the auction before making his opening lead. Not only did EW not get a favourable ruling from the opponent's failure to alert. gave East warning a unsportsmanlike behaviour, with the threat of a penalty if he engaged in similar gamesmanship in the future. Directors need to be on the alert for players who try to use the laws in a way which is against the spirit of the game. Many times a player's failure to alert arises either from forgetfulness or uncertainty about a call's meaning. It may be appropriate that they not be penalised for such innocent mistakes.

#### **Answers to Quiz**

- 1) No alert. Calls above 3NT (except for conventional opening bids) are self-alerting.
- 2) Alert. Even though the bid is natural, it conveys additional meaning of which the opponents may be unaware.
- 3) No alert. Bids of suits either bid or shown by the opposition are self-alerting.
- 4) No alert. Doubles and redoubles are self-alerting.
- 5) Alert. Normally calls above 3NT are selfalerting, but there is an exception for opening conventional calls.
- 6) Alert. Even though it is natural, most pairs would play this as forcing on West to make another bid, so the opponents don't know that it could be quite weak.
- 7) No alert. Bids of suits either bid or shown the by opposition are self-alerting.
- 8) Alert. Normally 2C after partner's opening bid would be self-alerting, but that only applies in a non-contested auction. Here, North's double means that it should be alerted.
- 9) No alert. Doubles and redoubles are selfalerting, regardless of what they mean.
- 10) No alert. Bids of denominations (ie. any suit or no-trump) bid by the opposition are selfalerting, even if they are totally artificially.

Remember, a self-alerting call means that the call is considered to be automatically alerted, and the partner does not need to go through the normal process for alerting.

My time in Western Australia, in the first week of July this year, started with a one-day Teacher Training Programme at Melville Bridge Club. The week that followed was the result of an ABF Special Marketing Grant application.



28 people came along to the Teacher Training Programme, on Sunday 29 June. The majority hailed from areas south of Perth. Bunbury was the most highly represented (10 people drove up for the day), led by Jim Offer and Monica Offer, and Peter Morgan and Jan Morgan, who have been at the helm of the club for a few years now. Their efforts, which include a modern teaching approach, have resulted in a big increase in membership. Other country areas represented were Busselton, Margaret River and Mandurah. Bayswater, Undercroft, Melville and South Perth also attended.



The TTP offers a modern approach to bridge teaching, and is based on successful methods that work. It's relevant for more areas of bridge than simply teaching. "How" to teach is the primary focus. "What" to teach is important too of course, but if teachers use the best materials, their job is



made a lot easier. The discussion was spirited, and I hope teachers embrace the concepts. As educators, it's necessary to constantly Selfanalyse and look for ways to improve teaching styles. This will mean a growth in bridge players – both for the club and the ABF.

Next stop was South Perth, where Jan Howell had stepped forward to organise two workshops, Improve Your Judgment: Doubles, and Defence: Signals and Counting Hands. Doubles was the most popular topic chosen by many of the clubs I visited. Melville, the next day, had asked for this too. I believe that people don't use doubles enough, simply because it never occurs to them to.

That same day I started my journey down south. Sandy Sutton-Mattocks came along to familiarize herself with the local organisers, to whom BAWA will offer assistance. There was a great turnout at Bunbury that night, where the topic was Opening Leads.

Busselton was next, and Margaret Nixon continues to do a good job in the teaching area there too. Doubles was it again, and in the afternoon, new material on End Plays. It's exciting to present declarer play topics like this, and find that people are able to play the hands, once the underlying principles are explained



On our way back to Perth, I gave a workshop on Defensive Signaling at Mandurah. That group, headed by Neville Walker with Doug Hardman, his wife Vera, and Eugene Wichems in the teaching role, was very enthusiastic. That was a busy day, and, (thanks to Sandy and Noel), I then boarded a plane to Kalgoorlie, for a lesson that night.

Pam Moore picked me up, and again, the topic of Doubles was selected. My memory of Kalgoorlie includes my speedy visit to the incredible Super Pit, where all that gold is mined. It's bigger than I could ever have imagined. Pam was a font of knowledge too.

The week disappeared very quickly. Thanks to all the people who made it so easy for me. Headed by Noel Daniel, they included Robina McConnell, Sandy Sutton-Mattocks, Di Nelson, Monica and Jim Offer, Peter and Jan Morgan, Margaret Nixon, Jan Howell and Pam Moore. I'm hoping to follow up with a Continuing Teacher Education programme next year in Perth.

## Teams of Four 2014

The Teams of Four Competition is again being run this year.

Numbers are down for this year, mainly due to what I believe was an unrealistic burden on some of the larger clubs. For example, WABC fielded seven teams last year which I know put a great strain on their team coordinators trying to find players at certain times of the year. Perhaps we should run a T of 4 in Broome during the winter months. © . I was particularly delighted to see Swan Districts remain for another year.

I would dearly like to see some fresh faces in this competition. I know some of the smaller clubs think that their members are not really interested in team matches, but for those players who wish to improve their rankings in the ABF Masterpoint scheme, there is no easier way than team matches. For example, you need to be in the top 50% to get MPs in a pair's event, but you can come absolutely bottom in a team's event and still get your Red MPs. This is because each member of the winning team gets 0.56 Red MPs in the Open, and 0.42 Red MPs in the Restricted and Intermediate Divisions for every win they achieve. So for all you clubs that have never taken part in this competition, or used to, but don't now, consider giving your members a chance to earn Red Points in 2015.

## **Marketing Report**

#### **Deadline for COTA Grants**

It is almost the last chance to get your applications in to the Council of the Aging for a grant of up to \$1000 to hold a special event at your club during the Bendigo Bank Seniors' Week to be held during the week of November 9th to the 16th. You can download an application form at www.cota.org.au but entries must be received by Friday August 1st. If you get in by this date you are eligible to be included in the significant advertising promoting the event by Bendigo Bank and COTA which includes your event in their online calendar and advertisement in their magazine, Have-a-Go, which targets the same audience that makes up the majority of our bridge clubs. If you miss the deadline you can still hold an event during Bendigo Bank Seniors Week but you will have to do your own advertising.

A tried and true event to get new people to your club is to run a Free Luncheon and Introductory Bridge Lesson (with four follow-up lessons at the ready). Ten percent of the grant monies allocated can be used for catering but there are few restrictions on the use of the other money except that it must be used specifically for the event of the day to show appreciation for the seniors in our community and includes expenditure like printing, name tags, lesson booklets, card packs to be given to the newcomers etc. Both the Gwynne Park Social Club in Armadale and the BAWA affiliated Bayswater Bridge Club in Bedford have germinated in these Bendigo Bank Week Luncheons and both wonderfully active and viable clubs with seven to ten tables regularly.

One event which is worth trying is the new approach of "Bridge in a Day" which was recommended at the recent National Marketing Conference held in Sydney. Hugh Grosvenor has run the event with great success in Tasmania and other places in the East. The reason for the large numbers coming to these events could be that the name of the event dispels the myth that bridge is

too hard to learn. Many people would like to learn bridge but are put off by the notion of the difficulty level but the idea that it can be taught in a day draws them in. We need to make sure that we provide a good introduction to bridge that is easy, fun and smooth which is the new way which is promoted in the US by Audrey Grant and Fred Gitelman and by our own ABF teacher Joan Butts. As bridge teachers we need to go back to basics when introducing bridge to people by teaching the mechanics with a hands on approach - get them playing straight away - and teach the play. Don't even mention the bidding. The way to do this is by starting like whist or euchre with just rounds of following suit, then playing mini-bridge which gives the logic of the bidding without even a word about it. "The play is the thing to catch" not the conscience of the King but to get the newcomers hooked like we are on the game. This year Bayswater Bridge Club is trialling the "Bridge in a Day" event on Wednesday 12th November with two hours before the free luncheon and two hours after, with four lessons to follow up.

#### **Directors' Course**

It was great to see that quite a few people managed to get to the long-awaited but scarcely advertised Directors' Course which is being given by expert director, Bill Kemp at the Undercroft Bridge Club on two Sundays July 20<sup>th</sup> and July 27<sup>th</sup> all day from 9.30am to 5.00pm.

An apology first of all - the timing of the course didn't allow for advertising in Focus and I apologise if any clubs were not informed about the course. Also because of the short notice many who wanted to attend were not able to organise changes to already fixed schedules. So whilst we are very appreciative of Bill giving the course now, it was the only time he is available, I hope that we will be able to arrange another course in the not too distant future as there is clearly a need for more education in this essential part of the game.

The first day included in-depth analysis of the rules and the various movements and next week will continue with this and look at the electronic side of directing including Bridge Mates. Patrick Smythe, a relative newcomer to bridge, found the first day fairly tiring as it covered a lot of ground but he found he was inspired to look further into various aspects of directing and has already found that knowledge of the rules has increased tremendously his understanding of the process of the game at the club.

## Real Poor Behaviour and Perceived Poor Behaviour

The National Marketing Conference held recently in Sydney isolated two main tenets that can both be covered in a single word, Education. The first is the notion that good teaching is the lynch pin in building successful clubs. The second is the notion that the main thing preventing retention rates at our clubs is poor behaviour which may not seem to have such a logical connection to education as good teaching does but it is a huge factor.

I have been grappling with the notion of poor behaviour for many years trying to find a solution. The first step is to actually identify the problem of poor behaviour. To me there are two types of Poor Behaviour, the one that is real and the one that is perceived. Some behaviours have a bit of both and the solution to all is knowledge. As teachers of bridge we need to educate our students how to deal with real poor behaviour and perceived poor behaviour which actually does more harm to the profile of bridge because even though it is more subtle it loses people swiftly.

Poor behaviour that is real includes grumpy, rude, ignorant, bad-mannered, negative, and loud behaviour. Luckily this is fairly rare. As teachers we need to mention that as with all sports and games bridge draws all types of people and "characters" and that unfortunately you may meet some at the table. However, people with very poor behaviour can be excluded and those who are mild are simply confined by the rules of the game. The main thing is that you only have to put up with them for a few minutes before you move on to the next table. Strategies: play your game, don't get involved, say hello at the

beginning and thank them at the end and move on. Simple. Alexandra Russell, who helped many players and teachers on strategies to promote bridge always said that the best thing to do is to tell new players to ignore rude behaviour and "whatever happens, don't let anything put you off the game you love".

The notion of Perceived Poor Behaviour came about when I realised that I am included in the newcomers' lists of poor behaviour. I play too fast. I had a complaint made after the game to the Director by a newcomer who said that I had been intimidating her and I was duly cautioned. I realised then how my behaviour had come across to the new player and ever since then I have been trying even harder to play more slowly. Now that I know how it can be perceived I teach my students how to deal with players who play too fast...leave your card face up until you are ready. Another perceived poor behaviour that has lost many newcomers is the process of claiming. We need to teach people that this is part of the game but equally we need to teach people to claim correctly and fairly especially with new players at the table. Rules need to be followed but extra time to explain the claim kindly helps to promote the game. Calling the Director is a process and an integral part of the game. Students need to know that the Director is the "servant" of the players, as it says in the handout given at the recent Directors Course and that they are there to ensure the game runs smoothly not as a punitive force. Teach students to call the director. Get them to call the director if they have made the error as it takes the sting out of it. On the other hand we need to make sure we call the director kindly if an error has occurred and that we always call "Director, please".

So, we need to teach our students strategies to overcome all types of behaviour and warn them of poor behaviour and the process of the competitive game that they may find a bit offputting but give them ways to cope until they are the ones claiming and playing a bit faster. Teach them not to be "sooky la la's" but at the same time we could all analyse our own behaviour to make sure we are following the rules of the game kindly and with awareness of how our behaviour is perceived by new players. In Bill Kemp's words at the end of his Directors' Course "It is a game after all."


The Menu: Antipasto followed by a main meal of any Pasta dish off the menu.

The evening seemed to zoom by and soon it was 9.50pm and all over. All agreed that they had had a great evening and at \$20 per head it didn't break the bank.


During the course of the evening some interesting and wild hands came up. Vera Hardman wanted me to share Board 1

## **Smarty Pants**


I'd like to address a subject that has concerned me for a while.

Many less experienced players give themselves a hard time when they see the possible results shown by 'Deep Finesse', and say things like "Oh, no! I should have made four hearts..."

First of all, I try to share that there are no 'shoulds' in bridge - only 'coulds' - as 'shoulds' tend to create guilt, and spoil your day. Then I explain that the results shown by deep finesse - or 'Smarty-pants', as I nickname it - are based on having seen all four hands, and seeing a way to achieve a particular contract that may be hard (or even totally illogical!) for us mere mortals.

A case in point was Hand 20 played at Bunbury on Friday, where W ended up in 3NT. Sitting S, I had overcalled 2D over E's 1D - having six to the AJ - and if my partner had lead his 10D, whatever declarer did I can knock out his control in the second round, and have four winners in my hand, with the AS as an entry, and was sure they were going down!

To my surprise, when I checked the possible outcomes, smarty-pants said that 4NT was makeable (and 5NT from E!), so I went back to the hand below, and analysed them.



Because I (as S) only had 2 hearts to the 6, I saw that declarer can finesse to the 8 in dummy, return to hand via the clubs - finessing my king), and finesse once more! Like, who in their right mind would finesse to the H8, knowing that the stronger hand had four winning diamonds!

#### The Rule of 2 & 3

As always, the minute you label something, the content seems more complicated, but trust me, this Rule isn't. The basis of the Rule of 2 & 3 is used for gauging whether you should open a preemptive hand, in all circumstances, revolving around vulnerability.

So let's look at the theory:

You are Non Vulnerable and the opponents are Vulnerable. If you assess the tricks that you lose, you can afford to bid, get doubled and go down by three tricks, giving away 500, when the opponents can possibly make Game, receiving 600+.

With both sides Non Vulnerable, giving away 500 is not good. Down 3, terrible, down 2, great!

When you are 'red' and the opponents are 'green', then extra care needs to be taken before you decide to pre-empt. Down 2 or 3: Terrible.

All vulnerable: Down 3: The Pits, whereas Down 2, you may come up smelling of Roses.

Happy bridging 😊



## Test Your Slam Play

The key to this hand is to play the trumps for just one loser, and there is a textbook play for this combination. You cash DA, and assuming everyone follows low, lead a diamond from dummy.

If East plays a low one, you put in the D8, picking up the suit for one loser if East started with Q10xx. If the 8 loses the trick, then you can later draw the final trump with your DK.

If East shows out on the second round, play the DK and lead one back towards the DJ9 to once again limit your trump losers to one.

It's a beautiful safety play, but alas, on this hand, it is not 100% foolproof. The problem is that you need to ruff a heart in dummy. If you play ace and another diamond, and West happens to have Q10xx, then when he wins the queen, he can play a heart, forcing dummy to ruff with the jack, and establishing the D10 as the setting trick.

The best you can do, at trick 2, is play a diamond to the jack. If West has Q10xx, then all is well. If East has Q10xx, then he will win the queen, but after you have ruffed a heart in dummy and cashed the diamond ace, you will have a marked finesse for the contract.

If East wins the diamond trick with the singleton queen – unlucky!

The moral: Put not your faith in books!

South's cards look more like a one-opening than a pre-empt, but the 4H bid was chosen at the table, no doubt because of the favourable vulnerability. It is a bit much to expect West to bid 4S facing a passed partner, although West does have excellent shape. Indeed, if West fails to find the right lead, it would be better to bid 4S and fail by one trick, with the normal play in diamonds (assume the queen is not with the pre-empter).

If you have the courage to bid 4S, there might be another benefit. North might bid a misguided 5H (do not sacrifice with a balanced hand). That will go two down with the right lead, but make otherwise.

A singleton trump holds no appeal against a preempt and in general it pays to attack. Too often a passive lead from rag cards can find dummy with strength in that suit to give declarer discards.

Here the attacking leads are a diamond or a spade. Both will work. If you lead the SA, the switch to diamonds is obvious. On the D5 lead, low from dummy, East will play the jack, cash the ace and return the suit. One down.



What would you bid as South?

To me, it is a no-brainer. There is only one correct bid in my book, which is 4S. I have 6 Spades and Partner has promised at least 3, unless he plans to double and bid his own suit. I

also have a void in the enemy suit. I trembled a little when Eddy bid 4NT, Roman Keycard Blackwood, then subsequently bid the small slam after confirming that I possessed one of the Keycards: the King of Spades.

How do you play 6S on the lead of the King of Hearts? So long as you pitch a Club on the Ace of Hearts, there is no problem with the play. I drew trumps, ruffed a Club, gave away a Diamond, and then pitched the other Diamonds on the established Club suit. We were the only pair in the Final who bid this slam and one pair asked me how we bid it. On hearing about my 4S response to Eddy's double, they said, "But you only had 5 Points" to which I replied, "Points Schmoints!"

Thank you to Nedlands Bridge Club for our very generous prize money as a result of winning the Final. I would also like to offer a sincere thank you to all the wonderful Nedlands ladies who organised such a terrific day and to Peter Holloway, the director. As the popularity of Congresses seems to grow and grow, let there be more!
